PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gerry and Arvid, all Kensmen thank you for your service as President, Vice President and as the Host of our 25th Reunion in Bloomington, MN. You have served the 43rd Bomb Group Association well.

President Richardson's First Report: Some of my friends have asked "How did you become roped into the President's Job?" The fact is that I volunteered with no arm twisting. I am extremely proud of my membership in the 43rd Bomb Group Association.

I was only 15 years old when the Japs bombed Pearl Harbor and I was extremely impatient to get into the war. It was a long 27 months before I was sworn in. There were no openings for pilot training at Shepherd Field. When I was told it would take a year or more for Bombardier or Navigator training, I opted for gunnery school, which only required 6 weeks of training. I was determined to go over seas as soon as possible, but I did not know about transition training at Westover Air Base, radar schooling at Langley Air Base and gunnery school at Tyndall Air Base. It was May 7, 1945 before we made it to the 63rd Squadron of the 43rd Bomb Group.

There was no question, in my mind, that we were the best crew and we would survive. We only flew 11 combat missions before the war ended and we were at the Jap airbase Atugi at the end. I was discharged February 16,1945 one month before my 20th birthday.

Our goal is to preserve our heritage and history forever. HOW? I do not know. I can think of some possibilities. I hope some of you have a better way and please share it with all of the Members of the 43rd Bomb Group Association.

Personally I favor a merger, however, not with another WWII Group. For they are facing the same problem we have, we are all "going west" in a relative short time. One possibility could be the 43rd Air Lift Group, which was deactivated in 2011 at Pope Air Force Base. They are the direct descendants of the 43rd Bomb Group. I had the pleasure of attending the ceremony at Pope. I was very favorably impressed with these people. I believe that it is possible that we could convince them to take over our association with the veterans of the 43rd Air Lift becoming eligible for membership. I do not believe that this would be and overly complicated merger. We have roots at Pope, for our founder Bob Butler was the Judge Advocate of Pope at one time as well as Mayor of Fayetteville, NC.

We could open our membership to others with an Air Force connection and other requirements to be formulated by our group. This would require an intensive recruitment program to attract new members to include especially younger people. The success would depend on how effective our recruitment program worked. It would be difficult and we could end up with more members but none willing and able to assume leadership and determined to preserve our history.

George Mason University will preserve our history and they are currently working on setting up a website that will be arranged so anyone can access this with cross reference to other items. Following is an up date from Scott Miller as to the progress and the plans for the future. It is hoped this will get ready by our 2012 Reunion in Dayton, Ohio.

The following is the Scott Miller e-mail:

'The team at George Mason University's Center for History and New Media (CHNM) began work on its Pacific Airwar Digital Archive in September 2011 with the goal of creating the definitive historical archive of the 43rd Bomb Group and making that archive available to any one at any time via the internet.

"In the first four months, CHNM has successfully built a digital platform for collecting and preserving all material relating to the 43rd and the 5th Air Force, while concurrently developing new search tools to make every item in the archive easily linked with related items that might be of interest to the user. While constructing this fundamental infrastructure, CHNM has also began collecting content—recording close to 30 oral history interviews also collecting and archiving over 350 documents, photos and diaries.

"With these fundamentals firmly established, CHNM will be moving aggressively on two major fronts over the next six to twelve months. Fist, CHNM will be seeking access to content—i.e. any photos, documents. diaries, memoirs, etc. from veterans and their families that will help tell the story of the 43rd.

"The Pacific Airwar Digital Archive will also be pursing grants and other forms of funding that will allow CHNM's Pacific Airwar working group to add to add badly need staff."

In addition, George Mason U has offered the 43rd BG Association the use of their facilities for future reunion, including the use of their dormitory if desired. Eventually they will assume some, if not all, of the operations at some future date. At this time this seems to be the most promising opportunity for us to reach our goal of preserving our history and our association. To my knowledge no commitment has been made by the Association except that we will give them access to all of the history we have.

Please contact your elected board member and make your ideas and thinking known to him, The decisions that will be made at the Dayton Reunion by the Board and voting members are the most important since our founding.

Nothing will happen unless you are wiling to participate! I urge each of you to express your ideas as to

how we can accomplish the goal of preserving our Association, history and heritage.

SPEAK UP NOW or FOREVER HOLD YOUR PEACE!

The Dayton Reunion is in the planning stage and will be detailed in the July Newsletter.

Ed,

Good to hear from you. Thank you for the opportunity to explain.

(For your reference I have attached the most current 43d Airlift Group Lineage and Honors. This document firmly establishes the current 43d Airlift Group as the successor to the original 43d Bombardment Group. Please understand that the "current as of" dates at the bottom of the document are for reference purposes only. The 2008 date is the last time the information was updated by the Air Force Historical Research Agency. I have been keeping the majority of it current since that time. Aside from operations and events all the information in the L&H is current.)

On 1 March 2001, as a result of Congressional mandated law, the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) process came to an official close on Pope AFB.

As a result of this law, the 43d Airlift Wing, as well as some of its subordinate groups and squadrons, was inactivated. In addition to these inactivations the real property that was then known as Pope AFB was transferred to Ft. Bragg and the Army. Now Pope Army Airfield is that area constituted by the flight line and the immediate area surrounding it. All Air Force units who were on Pope AFB are now tenant units on Ft. Bragg.

During that ceremony the 43d Operations Group, the successor to the fine heritage your 43d Bombardment Group founded, was re-designated the 43d Airlift Group. All the heritage associated with the original WWII 43d Bombardment Group lives on in the current 43d Airlift Group; as far as the Air Force is concerned it is the same unit.

Some of the confusion may stem from the way the Air Force assigns heritage, lineage and honors. When the 43d Bombardment Group became part of the 43d Wing, the heritage and honors from the group were "bestowed" on the Wing, that way the wing could share in the glory so to speak. When the Wing inactivated on 1 March 2011 all the heritage, Lineage and Honors were returned to the 43d Airlift Group (although it never really left, it was more like the Group shared its history with the Wing if that makes sense.)

I can assure you, as the 43d Airlift Group Historian, that the heroic efforts of all the men and women who have been a part of the 43d Bombardment Group in all its manifestations, lives on strong in the current Group. We are always interested to learn more and very soon it will be my main priority to make sure the current 43d is even more aware of its heritage than it is now.

Thank you again. Please let the members of the association know that I am always eager to hear stories, see photos and learn as much as I can about the history of the 43d!

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

On 26 June 1943 First Lieutenant William J. Sarsfield, Jr., and Second Lieutenant Charles E. Trimingham were the pilots of a B-17E Flying Fortress —tail number [4]12430— that departed Dobodura, New Guinea, on a bombing mission over Rabaul, New Britain Island.

While over the target, the aircraft —nicknamed naughty but nice—was damaged by anti-aircraft fire; the aircraft was having difficulty maintaining altitude on its return leg when it was attacked and shot down by Japanese fighter aircraft.

The navigator —Second Lieutenant Holguin— was able to parachute from the aircraft before it crashed. The other nine crewmen died in the crash. The loss was designated Missing Air Crew Report (MACR) 14590.

In April 1949 U.S. military personnel on New Guinea were led by indigenous personnel to a B-17 crash site on New Britain Island. The team recovered human remains that subsequently were transferred to Hawaii where they were interred as Unknown Remains in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. Additional recoveries were conducted at the impact site between 1984 and 2001. The teams recovered human remains and relevant non-biological material evidence found amid the debris field.

Their sacrifice, and the honor with which these men lived their lives, will never be forgotten.

Tom was a native of Acton, and graduated from the Acton-Boxboro Regional High School in 1974. After serving in the Navy, Tom worked as a Regional Project Manager in communications for the Digital Equipment Corporation in Maynard, MA and later in the Greensboro / Winston-Salem area of North Carolina. Recently he worked as a manager of Staples in Asheboro, N.C. A great lover of the outdoors, one of his favorite past times was coordinating outdoor music festivals. He enjoyed Blue Grass music and spent much free time searching for and collecting arrowheads. Tom is survived by his mother, Irene Dow of Brunswick, Maine formerly of Acton and the late Russell E. Dow of Acton. He is also survived by four brothers and their families; Russell and Debi Dow of Portland, Oregon; James and Elaine Dow of Brunswick, Maine; Robert and Lynda Dow of Sterling, MA; and Kenneth and Gail Dow of Acton, MA, as well as many nieces and nephews. Tom's kind nature and great sense of humor will be greatly missed. A private family service is planned.

U.S. officials identify remains of 11 missing WW II airmen

(CNN) – The U.S. Department of Defense on Thursday identified remains discovered in the South Pacific seven years ago as those of 11 airmen who had been missing since World War II.

The remains of Army Air Force Tech. Sgt. Charles A. Bode of Baltimore are to be buried Friday at Arlington National Cemetery. Bode was 23 when he was declared missing. A second burial service for the remaining 10 servicemen is scheduled to take place at the same site March 24.

The 11 servicemen had been missing since November 20, 1943, after the crew's B-24D Liberator left an airbase in Port Moresby, New Guinea. The crew was 20 miles north of the airfield when ground control lost contact with the plane,

Searches for the craft and its crew were unsuccessful, and in 1949, the missing servicemen were declared unrecoverable.

In 1984, U.S. officials were notified of the discovery of a World War II crash site in a ravine in the Morobe Province of Papua New Guinea. However, the threat of landslides prevented the recovery of the craft and remains. Twenty years later, search teams obtained human remains collected by local villagers.

The other crew members whose remains have been identified are: 1st Lt. Richard T. Heuss, 23, of Berkley, Michigan; 2nd Lt. Robert A. Miller, 22. of Memphis, Tennessee; 2nd Lt. Edward R. French, 23, of Erie, Pennsylvania; 2nd Lt. Robert R. Streckenbach Jr., 21, of Green Bay, Wisconsin; Tech. Sgt. Lucian I. Oliver, Jr., 23, of Memphis; Staff Sgt. Ivan O. Kirkpatrick, 36, of Whittier, California; Staff Sgt. William K. Musgrave, 24, of Hutsonville, Illinois; Staff Sgt. James T. Moran, 21, of Sloatsburg, New York; Staff Sgt. James B. Moore, 21, of Woburn, Massachusetts; and Staff Sgt. Roy Surabian, 24, of Medford, Massachusetts.
