

He has to be the best, He is still Crew Chief of the Confederate Air Force "Sentimental Journey", and also a hell of a nice guy. Our thanks to Ivan, and I'll get some copies for the reunion, or write and I'll send you one.

<u>DALE BARR</u>, 403rd, sent lists of casualty reports of the 43rd Bomb Group from first activation to 1944. We will post this list at the reunion. Hope we get the report for 1944 and 1945 before October. The report covers about 16 months and a loss of about 400 personnel. Also covers number of missions, bombs dropped, damage results, etc. Each Squadron did something best, 63rd, most shipping destroyed, 64th, most bombs dropped, 65th, most bombs on target (<u>LLOYD</u> has been telling me this for 40 years), 403rd, most enemy aircraft destroyed, and so on.

The 400 personnel lost in the sixteen months were when each Squadron had about 16 crews and total Group crews around 54. It was a little tough, I guess. You might want to drop <u>DALE</u> a note if you want more details on the 43rd from 1941 through 1945.

In going through some of my older mail, I found a long letter from \overline{FRED} \overline{EPPLEN} , 63rd. I don't think I ever mentioned the work \overline{FRED} did on checking out Colorado Springs last year. He did a great job. I'm sure his input set up the Springs for "89". Good job \overline{FRED} , and many thanks! All those making the reunion will be thanking you. A really great place.

A fellow in Tyler, Texas by the name of Elmer Dixson was Photo Officer for the 3rd Reco Squadron. He ended up with thousands of photos of the war in the Pacific. Back in February he was talking of giving these to the "Museum of the Pacific War". The Museum director, Bruce Smith, calls the photos "an amazing historical document". The museum is located at the Admiral Nimitz State Historical Park in Fredricksburg, Texas. If passing, stop by, it will be well worth your time.

JOHN S. "JACK" FAERBER, 65th, is all shook up, his last news letter was late getting to him. Thanks JACK, I was afraid no one was interested. Will try and do better this time. I had GEORGE WHITE making that mail route, should have known better!

One of my favorite friends, <u>BILL EATON</u>, 403rd, sent a three page letter (typed) to <u>JOEL GRIFFIN</u>, 403rd, and also sent me a copy. <u>JOEL GRIFFIN</u> and <u>JOSE HOLGUIN</u>, 65th, were the sole survivors of two separate B-17 crews. Now <u>BILL EATON</u> has come up with a third, <u>GORDON E. MANUEL</u>, 64th. All three aircraft were lost to Jap night fighters. Quentin Reynolds autobiography includes the story of <u>MANUEL'S</u> aircraft being shot down. I think Capt. <u>WILLIAMS</u> was the pilot (not sure). <u>MANUEL</u> bailed out, was taken in by natives, and was later picked up by U.S. <u>Submarine</u>. He met Reynolds in a hospital in New York. <u>BOB BUTLER</u>, 63rd, reported <u>GORDON E. MANUEL</u> passed away a few years back. Another great story. Hope <u>LARRY HICKEY and BRUCE HOY</u> get it all down.

Another threesome is <u>DONALD D. MC EACHRAN</u>, <u>JAMES T. PETTUS and MYSELF</u>. All three of us were pilots in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 40 and 41. Transferred to U.S. Army Air Force early 1942, along with many others, and we three ended up in the 43rd. <u>MC EACHRAN</u> was <u>JOEL GRIFFIN'S</u> pilot, and did not survive the mission. <u>JIM PETTUS</u> went on to be our Group C/O with 57 missions, in Japan for V.J. Day, etc. The third one sells used cars.

The 50th Anniversary of the B-24 was held in Fort Worth on May 17th through the 21st. I didn't get the head count, but it was well attended. Great times were had by all. The B-24 was produced in far greater numbers than the B-17. Served on more fronts, etc., so people from all over were there. Street Dancing, Texas Style Shoot-outs, the CAF B-24 in fly-by etc.

The 43rd was represented by BOB and DORIS BUTLER, 63rd, GEORGE and AILEEN WHITE, 63rd, LLOYD and HELEN BOREN, 65th, FRED and MAUREEN MC ALISTER, Hdgrs., ART MULLIGAN and NICK ARABINKO, both 64th, ROGER and AUDREY KETTLESON, 64th, WADE KEHR and GEORGE MUNSELLE, both 403rd. We picked up 10 new members in Fort Worth.

CLIFFORD and LORRAINE KOCHA, 65th, need help, they want to know how long the 65th was stationed at each station. The 65th arrived at Sydney the 28th of March 1942. Then New Castle, Torrens Creek, Iron Range, Mareeba, Port Moresby, Dobodura, etc. Check your records. CLIFF'S address is: 1102 Lark St., Green Bay, WI 54303.

FRED and MARGARET BLAIR, 63rd, wrote from Australia. He is going to his 50th Class Reunion at State University of New York at Plattsburg, NY. This takes place 11-16th of October, so will probably miss Colorado Springs. (Late news from HARRY URBAN. FRED is registered for one night only). We will miss FRED and MARGARET, they are regulars at our reunions. FRED sent in the following words to "TAPS":

Fading light dims the sight, and a star gems the sky, Gleaming bright from afar, drawing nigh falls the night, Dear one, Rest. In the West sable light dulls the day on her breast, Sweet good night. Now away to thy rest.

FRED also sent the words to "OFF WE GO INTO THE WILD BLUE YONDER" - wants copies for reunion. Will do it.

Got a note from the New Zealand Confederate Air Force saying anytime the 43rd is in their country, be sure to come out to Dairy Flat Airfield. Better still, let them know you are coming and they will show you around. I have to pay all these groups to get to be Col. That dern <u>GEORGE WHITE</u> got to be one for free (field promotion, he says) ain't fair!

RICHARD J. MROWINSKI, 403rd, he was on GEORGE PUTMAN'S crew, sent in a nice memorial gift in memory of S/Sgt. HOWARD J. BOGLE, KIA, 29th August 1943 over Wewak, he and Lt. ROBERT L. MURPHY, KIA, were hit by Ack Ack. Thanks DICK, I think the memorials we are putting up are most fitting.

HAL and MAUDE WINFREY, 65th, sent a big gift to the Memorial Fund. This is in memory of his crew. HAL was sick and CHARLES TRININGHAM took the crew out. Jap night fighters shot them down 26th June 1943. JOSE HOLGUIN bailed out and was the only survivor. Those lost, in addition to TRININGHAM, were: WILLIAM J. SARSFIELD, FRANCIS PEATTIE, ROBERT L. CHRISTOPHERSON, LEONARD A. GIDNET, ROBERT E. GRIEBEL, HENRY GARCIA, and PACE P. PAYNE.

This brings up another point. The directors want to keep the Memorial fund going. We feel very strong about the 400 lost up to Jan. 1944, and many more in 1944 and 1945. It is only fitting that we continue to place memorials at proper places. So if you find an extra dollar or two, send it to me. It will be a proud investment.

LEE and JOANN HOCKENSMITH, 65th, report that <u>KARL P. "DANCK" DANCKWERTH</u>, 65th, is a little under the weather, he has emphysema. <u>DANCK</u> needs mail so all of you that are friends of <u>DANCK</u> and can write, send him a note or call him at 201-472-6967. I really put the phone number in for <u>GEORGE WHITE</u>, he's not too smart. <u>LEE and JOANN</u> are all set for Colorado Springs.

The San Antonio Express, on May 29th, ran a story on "BLACK JACK" with a different twist. Jean Michael Cousteau arrived at Boga Boga, Papua, New Guinea on board a ship by the name of Calypso. His mission was to see the remains of Black Jack. The real twist of the story was that the ship he was on, "J-826", was built in Seattle the same month as B-17-41-24521. "J-826" went lend lease to the British service in the Mediterranean. 41-24521 did yeoman service in the Pacific. Some 46 years later they met again. Calypso and Black Jack together at last.

A nice note from BRUCE HOY for BILL and LUE SPENCER, 403rd. S/Sgt. RICHARD V. FOWLKES, 13035035, was killed on 3rd April, 1944 in B-24J # 42-73135 on take-off from Nadzab. Their mission was to have been Wewak, Hollandia. BILL and four others of the crew were killed. Please pass this information on to Mrs. FOWLKES. For ROGER PARRY, 65th, BRUCE says S/Sgt. PAUL R. ELLIS was killed in the crash of B-24D, # 42-41089, 26th November, 1943. Plane crashed in a small valley southeast of Jackson strip, close to Bootless Bay Inlet, time 0230. Mission, recon over Gasmata.

PAUL BLASEWITZ, 63rd, BRUCE wants a copy of General Order # 197 dated 15th September, 1943. He is missing this one. Any one who saved General Orders send BRUCE a list of the numbers you have. He can cross check and let you know if he wants them. BRUCE has spent many years in New Guinea checking on downed aircraft. He plans to start writing a number of you shortly. His address is BRUCE HOY, P.O. Box 249, Aspley, QLD 4034, Australia.

Col. <u>GEORGE L. WHITE</u>, 63rd ball gunner, late of the New Jersey Air Force, is and project officer of the 43rd Bomb Group Book, is trying to raise enough money to get <u>BRUCE HOY</u> to Colorado Springs for the reunion. <u>BRUCE</u> could meet everyone

GENERAL

- 1. We must locate color movie film, slides or photos showing aircraft artwork, bases, missions, etc. for the 50-60 color photos planned for the color section of the book. Does anyone have or know of same?
- 2. We currently have two out of four potential sponsors for the four squadron paintings being commissioned for the book. We need sponsors for two other paintings.
- 3. We need hard copies of any of the Group or Squadron records from the Maxwell AFB archives microfilms or copies of the originals obtained overseas with the unit. This includes copies of both Group and Squadron historical reports.
- 4. Require details of construction of SQ clubs at Jackson Field early 43.
- 5. Urgently need copies of diaries, flightlogs, narratives for major decorations such as Silver Stars, Purple Hearts, DFC, DSC, etc.
- 6. The 63rd SQ maintained a SQ diary until the end of their B-17 operations. Does anyone know of the existence of squadron diaries for 64th, 65th, and 403rd, and for 63rd from Sept 43 to Aug 45?
- 7. Require eyewitness accounts of mid-air collision between Capt. Giddings Capt. Mc Arthur near Hood Point on 17 April 43. Also require the crew listing for the B-17s flown by Capt. Giddings and Capt. Salisbury.
- 8. Serial number required for the B-17 ditched by Capt. Jean A. Jack near Urasi Island on 5 January 43.
- 9. Names of the crew required for the B-17 ditched by Lt. Ray Dau on 24 May 43. Pilot was Ray Dau, Navigator was 1/Lt. John Hanlon and the bombardier was 1/lt. Max Mayer. Who were the others? Also need description of the ditching.
- 10. Need the current address for Byron Heichel who survived the loss of his airplane on 7 May 43 and was captured by the Japanese. 403rd Jack K. Wisener also survived being shot down on 13 June 43, last known address was Austin, TX, as a

member of the State legislature. Paul F. Cascio is also believed to have survived his crash on 1 June 43. Contact with Mr. Cascio may assist the Army's recent reinvestigation of the crash-site.

- 11. B-17E #41-2481 crashed on take-off at Seven Mile on 27 Aug 43, Clarence O'Connor being the pilot, equipment failure being the cause. Who were the other members of this crew?
- 12. B-17E #41-9234 crash-landed near Wau on 8 Jan 43 following a mission to Wau. Did this airplane have a nickname?
- 13. We previously requested information on the following nicknamed B-17s: THE VIGOROUS VIRGIN, CAROLINE, CHICO (64TH), STUD DUCK (64TH), SUPER SNOOPER (63RD), STRIP STRAFER, GONE FOREVER, FRANK BUCK (19TH BG?), and FLAGSHIP TEXAS II. Add to list GYPSY ROSE. Except where already noted, we need squadron assigned, tail numbers and crew chiefs' names.
