

Come to St. Louis to see where it all began, and have a grand-ole-time seeing your friends once again, do some exciting things and stay at a truly great hotel - the Marriott Pavilion Hotel, right smack-dab in the middle of everything in the downtown area. Many of you are already familiar with Marriott's high quality of service and facilities. This will be no different. In fact, the location here makes it even better! So, y'all come,

Again, a reminder that there is plenty to do on your own within easy walking distance of the hotel. If you don't want to walk, then there is the Levee Line Bus to ride free around downtown St. Louis. As an example, one place you should visit is the Gateway Arch. In addition to enjoying its majestic beauty, visit its excellent Museum of Westward Expansion, then ride to the top of the Gateway Arch. Your ride will start 50 feet below ground on a train-like tram that will carry you on special tracks up through the hollow, curving legs of the Arch (your tram capsule will stay level all the way up). At the top, you will walk into an enclosed observation room, 630 feet above the ground, for a fantastic, 30 mile panoramic view of Missouri and Illinois. It is breathtaking; don't miss it!

Reunion registrations are beginning to roll in. If you have not already done so fill out the registration/survey form included in this newsletter, and send it in with your reunion fee. Remember, everyone who registers by mail before September 20th, will be eligible to win in the A-2 Leather Flying Jacket drawing during the Thursday evening program.

All the hotels in the city of St. Louis are not permitted to provide Airport Shuttle Service. Therefore, upon arrival by air, you must go by Airport Limo Service (at \$6.00 per person), or, taxicab (\$20.00, regardless of the number of persons), to and from the hotel. If you ask at the Airport Limo desk, they have a special round trip rate. The airport is 15-20 miles from the hotel.

Once again, the St. Louis Reunion dates are October 8th through noon on October 14th. Scheduled activities begin on Wednesday, October 10th. On this date all the tournaments and Squadron meetings are scheduled. So plan to arrive early enough to enjoy all the activities. You won't regret it.

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This is the first month that members who are not paid up for 1990 will receive no newsletter, and of course, they did not receive a roster. I dropped about 300 from the roster last year who had not paid for either 1988 or 1989. We still have almost 300 more who have not paid for 1990, however, I left them on the roster, and will mail them this newsletter and the roster only when and if they send their dues in. Starting next month, I will begin dropping these names from the computer if they have not paid. Not counting either the Life members, who are paid up, of course, and the Associate members, the majority of whom, do not pay dues, we had roughly 700 members who had paid dues for 1990 as of the date the roster was published. This figure is about 63% of our membership at that time, and this is counting the Life members. This percentage of paying members is slightly better than before we started dropping members for non-payment of dues, however, you must remember, we had reached 1534 members before we started dropping the no-pays. We have four newsletters yearly and one roster to get out, the cost has risen as we have increased the size of both the newsletter and the roster. This is our major expense, and is in addition to the normal expense of running the organization, ie: office supplies, upkeep on machines, rent, postage, mailing of newsletters and roster, etc. I donate my time, which averages 4-6 hours daily including Saturdays and even Sundays when I am getting

out the newsletters and roster. This has enabled us to concentrate on our largest problem which has always been, getting more members paying dues. Look at your roster, see if you can spot anyone you know, and get them to pay up before they are dropped. If they pay afterwards, it makes twice the work for me. I have to put them back on again and send out the roster and newsletter <u>first class</u> which costs us \$1.65.

While I am in a griping mood, let me ask any of you who move to <u>please</u> fill out a post office change of address for me. This is what it costs us if you don't. The original postage is cheap, .084 cents. When the postman returns it with your new address or for any other reason, he collects .65 cents for a newsletter from Helen, or \$1.00 for the roster. Then I have to put another .65 cents or \$1.05 on the piece of mail to re-send it. Helen keeps good track, and she gets reimbursed. This all amounts to a total cost to us of \$1.38 for a newsletter, or \$2.13 for a roster, all because someone didn't send us a change of address. Have a heart fellows.

 ${\hbox{\hbox{\it GORDON}}}$ ${\hbox{\hbox{\it BAVOR}}},$ ${\hbox{\scriptsize Hdqrs.}},$ writes of his experiences as a radio operator on ${\hbox{\scriptsize {\it Glen}}}$ ${\hbox{\scriptsize {\it REAM'S}}}$ crew flying in "THE OLD MAN" after the 65th's March 8, 1943 mission over Gasmata where <u>EHLERS</u>, <u>BRYANT</u>, <u>COCHRAN</u>, <u>and BOREN</u> were wounded in a 13 zero gunfight. The ship was taken out of service and reconditioned, and turned over to Lt. General Ennis Whitehead for his personal use. This plane was later replaced by a B-17G # 4483555. GORDON was radio/operator on both planes, both named "THE OLD MAN". They flew about 5 days a week (Whitehead was C/O 5th AF at that time) out of Clark, Okinawa, Nichols, etc. While getting "THE OLD MAN" ready for a flight to australia, their crew and General Kenney's crew were ordered to go back to the States and pick up two new B-17's and fly back to Clark. That was done, and he never heard whether "THE OLD MAN" went to Australia or not, but he never saw the ship again. **GORDON** says the new B-17G served them well.

Note from <u>LLOYD</u>: I never knew that we had the B-17G in the S.W. Pacific, but then I left a couple months after the first "Old Man" was shot up. I had always been under the impression that the B-17F's were the last, and were replaced by the B-24. Does anyone know how many of the B-17G's we ended up with, and how many were in Combat. Does anyone know the eventual fate of B-17F "THE OLD MAN" that was converted for General Whitehead, and was eventually replaced by B-17G "THE OLD MAN"?

GORDON BAVOR also sent a list of the original crew which flew General Whitehead in "THE OLD MAN" after it's conversion.
