# FOR THE 43RD BOMB GROUP'S GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY REUNION IN BEAUTIFUL TIDEWATER VIRGINIA by BOB and SHIRLEY RICHARDSON

It is appropriate that we return to the birth place of the 43rd to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the organization of the 43rd at Langley Field in 1941. Our base for our eleventh reunion will be the lovely Omni International (Waterside) in Norfolk, VA. from Monday, October 21 through Sunday brunch October 27, 1991. The actual business and affairs of the reunion start on Wednesday the 23rd, but there are so many interesting places of Historical interest in this immediate vicinity that you may want to come early and/or stay later.

The Omni in downtown Norfolk is directly on the waterfront with a panoramic view of the harbor or the completely revitalized downtown Norfolk greeting you from your luxurious bedroom window. Watch as ships from all over the world ply the waters with tug boats churning alongside only a few feet away. Pleasure boats tie up at the Hotel. The meeting rooms are well appointed and quite spacious. The staff adds new meaning to "Southern Hospitality". Your slightest wish is their command. It is also the home of the Omni Dinner Theatre.

Adjoining the Omni is the Waterside Festival Marketplace with over 120 fine shops, Kiosks, Push Carts and five International Restaurants. Room Rates in this excellent Convention Center are normally in the \$150.00 range, however, during our reunion, the price for you is \$66.00 single or double occupancy including parking in the adjoining parking garage.

Our Hotel stands on part of the original 50 acres purchased from Nicholas Wise in 1660 to form the town of Norfolk. Prior to the revolutionary war, Norfolk, blessed with one of the worlds best natural harbors, was a bustling seaport exporting furs, tobacco, and timber. On January 1, 1776, the city was severely damaged by a British ship commanded by Lord Dunmore. Colonists, unwilling to let their city fall into British hands, completed the destruction by burning all remaining buildings before the British could occupy the city. The only remaining building was St. Paul's Church which, to this day has a British cannon ball stuck into the Southeastern wall. Because of the harbor and strategic location, the town was resurrected soon after the war and in 1845, became a city. Norfolk

rapidly became the largest exporter of coal in the world. However, bad luck continued to plague the city, and in 1855, an epidemic of yellow fever, brought in on a visiting ship, killed 1/3 of the population. In 1862, the city was captured by Union Forces and occupied by the Yankees for the rest of the Civil was a to be a second to workely and during world was at hundreds of War. In 1917, the Navy moved to Norfolk, and during World War II, hundreds of families moved into the area, doubling Norfolk's population and transforming this strategic Navel Base into the largest Military installation in the World. The Military is by far the greatest source of revenue for the area.

A good part of the sites representing the early history of our Country are within a short drive. Jamestown, the first english speaking settlement in the New World, Colonial Willimsburg, restored first Capital of Virginia and seat of modern democracy. Williamsburg was the training ground for many of the Fathers of our Country including Washington and Jefferson. Yorktown is the site of the surrender of General Cornwallis to Washington.

Sight seeing opportunities abound with Colonial Williamsburg, Jamestown-Yorktown, Norfolk Naval Base and Ships' tour, Busch Gardens, Mariner's Museum, Fort Monroe, NASA Visitors Center, Douglas MacArthur Memorial, Chrysler Museum of Art, Norfolk Botanical Gardens, Hermitage Foundation Museum, Saint Paul's Episcopal church, and many, many more. Many of these are within easy walking distance of the Omni Hotel. Tours will be available on demand, with a minimum of 30 per tour.

Lt. <u>EASTER</u> was hit by zeros and he was mortally wounded. He recalls that <u>JIM</u> was a great guy and had previously been his co-pilot when he first joined the 43rd. <u>JIM</u> flew many missions with the 65th. <u>JIM'S</u> co-pilot who brought the plane back to Dobadura, badly disabled, and with other wounded aboard, did a really fine job.

It was his first mission in combat, as it was FLETCH'S job to take as many crews as possible on their first combat mission. 


