I sent him a roster. TERIO was recalled in 1950, and was sent to Germany as a 2nd Lt. in an anti-aircraft unit equipped with 90 MM guns. He was amazed how easy it was to knock down a target, and can't understand how we came through some of the missions back in the 40's. He says that while in Germany, he had to undergo some eye surgery, and was assigned a room in the hospital. It turns out his roommate was his Navigator from WWII, JAMES MASON, who was as surprised as he was, especially since he was now an Officer. Lt. MASON has since passed away. TERIO is in the VA Hospital in Truth or Consequences, New Mexico. He is a retired Lt. Colonel with the New Mexico Air Reserve National Guard.

Received a bulky communication from \underline{FRED} \underline{BLAIR} , 65th, of Australia, who was trying to find " \underline{BLACK} \underline{JACK} " \underline{EDKINS} for me. Received a letter sent to both us, and the 19th Group, from Roger R. Marks, 20 Koumala St., Mansfield, Oueensland 4122, Australia. He is researching the WWII period history of ALL the airfields of Queensland, used to any extent by RAAF and/or Allied Air Forces. He intends to publish the results of his study as "Queensland Airfields WWII - 50 Years On", in May 1992 to accord with the 50th anniversary of "Coral Sea". It will be a "then & now" type book.

In particular, he needs first hand knowledge as per the following quote: "There is a particular event I'd like to be able to authoritatively document from Squadron records. Residents of Coen (13.46 degrees South; 143.07 degrees East), speak of a Flying Fortress (4 engines definitely!) landing on a grass area in the township, either because of fuel or simply being unaware that the proper airfield was some 14 miles north of the township. The date is not known beyond the fact that one of the residents concerned recalls having left Coen in August '42. Therefore, it seems the date is likely between December '41 and August '42. Allegedly, the aircraft suffered minor damage (tipping onto nose? and breaking an undercarriage wheel) which was repaired over a period of "some days". It took off after the "full length" of the grass strip was restored by the removal of the "obstacles" - viz 44 gallon drums, filled with concrete, and placed half-way along the strip."

In addition to the above, he needs recollections and photos from veterans who spent time there during $^{\prime}39-^{\prime}45$.


