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

Received a letter from <u>JANICE OLSON</u>, daughter of the late <u>CHICK OLSON</u>, 64th, telling us about her junket to Papua New Guinea and the celebration marking the 50th anniversary of the Bismarck Sea Battle...<u>JANICE</u>, I hope you can get to our reunion in Omaha so that you can tell your story to all....However, <u>JANICE</u> needs some questions answered which have arisen since her visit to the battle area. She needs more information about a recently discovered aircraft outside of Wau which was piloted by <u>HOWARD EBERLY</u>, and has tail number 41-24552. Also, she would like a plat of the 43rd campsite at 7 mile strip, showing the tent area, clubs, messes, latrines, etc. <u>JANICE'S</u> address can be found in our membership roster. <u>JANICE'S</u> letter to Breezy and the story of her trip follows:

Dear Breezy: Good cheery days to you and hope all goes well. I have returned from my junket to Papua New Guinea with many new tales to add to a lot I have heard. 'Don't think the place has changed much. I was extraordinarily fortunate to be able to pay tribute to the participants of the Battle of the Bismarck Sea, twice. I have written an account and enclosed it for your consideration in distributing to the members. 'Am trying my darndest to make it to the reunion with photos of what the place looks like 50 years later. 'Hope to see you all. JANICE.....

<u>JANICE'S</u> STORY A glaring haze blanketed Lae, Papua New Guinea on March 3, 1993. This was the day I had selected for a Battle of the Bismarck Sea commemorative fly-over.

Fifty years ago on this date low lying clouds caused delays in locating the Japanese fleet off Finschaven. In 1993 the clouds were high and the haze a reflective irritant but there was no difficulty in seeing across the expanse of the Bismarck Sea when we arrived at a little after 10:00 am.

The ocean was calm, having long ago washed over the remains of that battle; however, I was there to remember, and in my own silent way, pay tribute to a group of men who were all heroes to me: The men who participated in the Battle of the Bismarck Sea, whether they were flying an aircraft or waiting on the ground for one to return.

In a confidential report prepared by Maj. General Ennis Whitehead on April 6, 1943, or roughly the hours of 10:00 am and 11:00 am on March 3, 1943, or roughly the hours of my flight 50 years later, a 5,000 ton ship was hit and a 4,000 ton ship was sunk by the 65th Squadron. The 64th Squadron reported seeing a destroyer sink at 10:20 am and the 63rd Squadron reported two ships burning at

10:25 am. I looked out over the expanse of water; there was on small craft plying the sea. I tried to imagine what it would be like, flying at almost twice our altitude of about 4,000 feet, trying to hit a speck on the water. I tried to envision the air full of P-38s, A-20s, B-17s, Beaufighters, B-25s and Zeros, but a sky free of planes and a sea free of ships made the attempt impossible. I'll never know what it was like but that didn't keep me from thinking about the men who do know.

There were no bands or cheers or speeches. Just a lone plane flying over the Bismarck Sea in honor of the men who were there 50 years ago.

Thanks to the Royal Australian Air Force, the bands and cheers and speeches did take place a week later in Madang, Papua New Guinea, during a quickly-organized commemoration of the 50th anniversary. With an incredible stroke of luck, I was able to hitch a ride on a fully-restored C-47 Dakota from Port Moresby to Madang to - as I put it - stand in for the B-17 contingent.

The event was held from March 11 to March 16, and while I was only able to join the battle of the bismarck sea reunion for a day and a half, that was time enough for me to witness the sincere tribute paid to all the participants of that battle. At dinner on the evening of Saturday, March 13, U.S. Ambassador to Papua New Guinea, Bill Farrand, paid his highest respects to all the people who served. Regrettably, with more than one hundred guests in attendance, the only people from the U.S. other than the Ambassador and his attache, were me and four members of the 3rd Attack Group, who flew a-20s during the Bismarck Sea Battle. All my friends in the 43rd were with me in spirit, however. They had all given so freely of their time and their knowledge of New Guinea to help me prepare for my voyage to see the country and its World War II sites. You can take some heart, though...while Ken's men may only have had the daughter of one of its members to represent them at the reunion the Jolly Rogers weren't represented at all.

As for the rest of my trip, well, I walked around the 43rd Group camp area at "7-mile" trying to get my bearings and figure our which concrete pads belonged to which buildings. I got a tour of the air strip, courtesy of the Department of Civil Aviation; parts of the old 7-mile strip are still visible and lots and lots of Marsden matting is in evidence. Revetments on the north side of the strip are still in place, having evolved into their own ecosystems, with grasses, bushes, trees and animal life.

I visited three B-17 crash sites; <u>JOE HOLGUIN'S</u> #41-2430, Naughty But Nice, outside of Rabaul; <u>RAY DAU'S</u> #41-9234, outside of Wau; and the recently discovered <u>HOWARD EBERLY</u> plane, #41-24552, also outside of Wau. At <u>JOE HOLGUIN'S</u> plane, we cleaned the leaves and moss from an overturned wing and when we left the area, we flew over the site in a helicopter, and there, shining through the jungle canopy, as pretty a sight as anyone could ever hope to see, was the USAAF star.

I would greatly appreciate any information anyone has on any of these aircraft. Also, I would like some information on the 43rd Group camp site at 7-mile; the area to the west of the camp site is being graded for government housing. Eventually the construction is expected to cover the 43rd's area. I want to reconstruct the 43rd's camp in map form, showing clubs messes, tents, etc. before it's all gone. Can you remember where your tent was from some landmark, such as a club, or latrine? Or whose tent was next to yours? Or the approximate location of roads? If so, please send anything you recall about the area to Janice Olson, 857 W. Impala Circle, Mesa, Arizona, 85210-5918.

TOM FITZGERALD, Secy/24 Squadron Association, New South Wales, sent us his latest newsletter informing us of their preparations for ANZAC DAY....The 24 Squadron was an Australian B-24 outfit. Maybe some of you guys remember them training with the 43rd. Lloyd, if you read this, I hope you've sent him a copy of our newsletter. (Note: I did)

From Palm Desert, CA comes our latest recruit to the 43rd Bomb Group Assn. along with a check for dues, \underline{JOHN} G. \underline{YEAGER} , 403rd. He joined the Group in September 1944 until he was sent home. The officers of the Group want everyone to know that he worked for the Group night and day. Because of his relentless pursuit of the 43rd's lost members, the Group is as large as it is today.....I know, <u>NOELLE</u>, that he was unable in recent years to do the job he wanted to do because of his illness, but please remember the 43rd owes him our thanks and prayers.

"This is to inform you that my husband, <u>WILLARD L. HUMPHRESS</u>, 65th, was killed on March 13, 1993, when a tree fell on our home during a severe ice storm of unpredicted proportions (called the Storm of the Century in the South) that hit the Atlanta area. We had just returned home 5 days previously from a 21 day trip to Australia and New Zealand, a trip he had wanted for years. Having served in the Pacific in World War II, he wanted to return to the Pacific under pleasant conditions. We had a glorious trip."

We received an obituary from HOWARD L. SPILLYARDS, 65th, telling us of the death of another 43rd man, JOHN ROY O'NEAL, a pilot of the 64th Squadron. He was in a VA nursing home for several years. Thanks, HOWARD, he will be remembered at our memorial services we have at each reunion.

Former 403rd Commander, <u>FRANKLYN T. GREEN</u> passed away on Feb. 23, 1993. This news was given to us by <u>ROGER VARGAS</u>, 63rd. Since I served under Col. <u>GREEN</u> as a member of the 403rd, I would be remiss if I didn't write a few words about <u>FRANK</u> He was the pilot on LULU BELLE, A/C #124358, that was flown from Hamilton Field, CA. to Australia in August, 1942. He was originally in the 63rd which was formed from the Panama Cadre. He was a proponent of the skip-bombing technique and participated, along with 4 other 63rd and 2 403rd crews on the first skip-bombing mission in Rabaul Harbor on Oct. 23, 1942...All this is supported by <u>ROGER VARGAS'S</u> letter we received. Our prayers to his family.

"HE WAS PROUD TO HAVE BEEN ONE OF KEN'S MEN"....writes the widow of <u>KENNETH M. HILLAS</u>, 65th. <u>KEN</u> passed away on January 2, 1993. <u>BETSEY</u>, we are proud to have been associated with your husband too. His memory will be remembered each memorial service the 43rd Group holds.

We cordially invite all widows to remain members of the 43rd Bomb Group Assn. so that we can keep in touch with and you can keep in touch with all the members who knew and fought with your husband. We invite all widows of our warriors to come to the reunions and share our sympathy for our fallen comrades. Simply let LLOYD know that you want to continue receiving the newsletter, and you will be made an Associate member.

<u>VINCE</u> had known about this group years ago, he would have died a happier man. He talked so often about the "TEN HITS & A MISS", and it's crew. The best man at the wedding of <u>VINCENT & AILEEN</u> 50 years ago was our association member <u>JOSEPH C DI MAURO</u>, 64th.

May I interject a personal thought here? This has been the toughest newsletter I have ever been associated with. Had a nice letter from <u>BOB & DORIS BUTLER</u>, 63rd. They had heard from <u>JANICE</u> <u>OLSON</u>, and sent a copy of her letter which I am including as it gives more details on the plane and crew she is looking for. You fellows in the 65th especially, see if you can come up with anything that might help her. She is in the roster. <u>BOB & DORIS</u> will see us in Omaha.

The following is from a letter to BOB DORIS from JANICE OLSON:

New Guinea survived me and I survived New Guinea. Every single day of the three weeks was an incredible experience - and Doris was right - Barramundi is a gift from the Gods.

I trekked the 43rd camp site, toured "7-mile" with FIVE armed guards, circled Hood Pt., crossed the Owen Stanleys so many times I lost count, toured Lae, Salamaua and Bismarck Sea in a light plane, toured Rabaul in a helicopter and buzzed Vunakanau. I also hiked into three B-17 crash sites: one 63rd Sq. and two 65th Sq. Which brings me to this particular cry for help: one of the B-17s, #41-24552, piloted by <u>HOWARD J. EBERLY</u>, 65th Sq., was last seen September 15, 1943. The plane was discovered by opossum hunters in October, 1992. Except for local residents, no one but me has been in there, even though U.S. authorities were notified in October. Crew remains are still there, for Pete's sake, and the locals are pilfering the site. But that's another problem. One of the locals had taken a gold I.D. bracelet with HOWARD I EPERLY/S name and social number of its taken a gold I.D. bracelet with **HOWARD J. EBERLY'S** name and serial number on it.

I paid this upstanding citizen a visit and through methods I'd prefer not to discuss, but which did not involve money, I came away with the bracelet <u>and</u> my life. Now I want to get the bracelet back to the family. The Army Remains Recovery Section has ignored letters and contacts; Sen. McCain, who gets a lot publicity for his "M.I.A" work, has ignored requests - so I'm going to ignore them and try to find the family myself. Maybe it would be appropriate for the 43rd to return the bracelet when the family's found?

 \underline{BOB} - do you have any suggestions on where I can start a search? I'm hoping someone in the 65th might remember \underline{EBERLY} and/or crew members and where they're from. I have no intention of embarrassing our government - I just want the families to know. These guys have been MIA for 50 years, for cryin' out loud. $\underline{HELP!}$.
