It changed my life forever--more than any other experience or achievement.

FROM LARRY HICKEY - HISTORY UPDATE - 2/94

I have been overwhelmed by the tremendous response for information, photos, etc., from the last questionaire. Thanks to the many of you who responded. I've got several areas on which I still need your help. Please respond immediately if you can be of assistance. Larry Hickey, International Research & Publishing Corporation, P.O. - [1] Have recently discovered a 65/43 B-24 plane loss about which I need information to completely finish all B-24 material for 1993. On October 28, 1943, a 65th plane (#217) and crew went down 30 miles from Milne Bay after bombing Gasmata Airdrome. 7 W/A, 3 OK, all rescued by PBY. Have no info whatsoever on crew and circumstances of loss. Need anyone with info on this incident or names of men involved to contact me immediately. Strangely, there is no mention of this incident in either squadron or group records.
- [2] We are attempting to include photos of all Group and Squadron C.O.'s in book. We need photos of the following GP C.O.'s: HAROLD E. SMITH, FRANCIS B. VALENTINE, CONRAD H. DIEHL, JR., & EDWARD W. SCOTT. The first three were before unit entered combat. Regarding SQ C.O.'s, we need photos of any who served before 43rd entered combat. Also: 63rd Majors BENN, SCOTT, VAN TRIGT, COLEMAN, DERR, PARKS & BRONNFIELD; 64th BLEASDALE, LINDBERGH, BRECHT, PARKER, and anyone in late 44 through end of war; 65th: HAYES, Capt. WILLIAM A. SMITH, WHITE, PETTY & WILLIAMS; 403rd: CHARLES (killed 11/29/42), GREEN, BRAGG, and anyone C/O during last half 44 through end of war, including CLARK & BOND.
- [3] I need the full name, rank and duty position of the man named <u>BARTIGAN</u> who painted the elaborate nose art on many of the 43rd's B-24s late in the war. Who was he? Anyone know anything about him? Ed. He painted the "Dragon and His Tail".
- [4] Got much good info on planes from last questionnaire. Still need the following: 64th photos of the following nose art/nicknames camouflaged B-24J #864 SMITTY, JR., silver B-24's #256 CHERRY & #262 OKLAHOMA OUTLAW (we thought this was SHAWNEE RAIDER, but this must be in error), #028 MICKIE'S MENACE. Still need confirmation of tail numbers of early camouflaged B-24D's ZOMBIE (poss #913) & HELEN'S REVENGE (poss #916); 65th: need tail numbers of B-17 RED MOOSE EXPRESS, silver B-24 KANSAS CITY KITTY (late war). We have two mystery silver B-24's for which we have never been able to confirm squadron; LADY FROM LEYTE (#807) and MANILA CALLING (# unknown). They have been reported in both the 64th & 65th, but I've never been able to confirm #807 as a B-24 tail number in either squadron. Anyone got this tail # in their logbooks, or a photo or logbook reference to MANILA CALLING?
- [5] Finally, I'm getting ready to finalize my 43rd Planes, Pilots and Crew Chief's appendix. If you have any logbooks or mission lists that contain mission dates, with plane tail numbers, or plane nicknames, please make a copy and send them to me immediately.




