FOR YOUR INFORMATION THIS LETTER WAS READ AT THE MAREEBA AIRDROME ON V J DAY.

We are honored to be asked to share this day with the Mareeba Shire Counsel and Australia Remembers Committee. V.J. Day was accomplished by the joint efforts of the Australia and United States of America forces. The 19th Bomb Group (H) was based at the Mareeba Airdrome in 1942. Finding safe haven after the Japanese over ran the Phillipines and the Dutch East Indies, the 19th was short on personnel and equipment. The RAAF helped fill the air crew ranks and repair the aircraft ---- the 43rd Bomb Group (H) arrived at Mareeba in September of 1942. The 19th was redeployed to the USA with help from the RAAF and experienced personnel from the 19th Bomb Group; the 43rd was on it's way. Mareeba Airdrome was the first air base the Japanese did not capture ---- for the 43rd it was the Spring Board to Victory. The 43rd was present at the signing of the surrender terms by Japan. We are very proud to have had a part in the beautiful memorial at the Airdrome ---- it expresses our love and admiration for each of you and your help, and a permanent memorial to those who no longer make roll call ---- so long ago and so far from home. The bonds between our two great countrys were welded together. May they always endure!


