NEIL FAIRBANKS, 403rd Sqd. from, Anoka, MN, called to report on the 50th Anniversary of the U.S. Air Force to be held in Las Vegas, NV, from April 22nd - 26th, 1997. NEIL and ROGER KETTLESON, 64th pilot from Las Vegas, are involved with this celebration and the 5th Air Force. NEIL, a delegate on the 5th Air Force Memorial Foundation, says that foundation has decided not to have a formal meeting during the 50th anniversary celebration. Registration is \$18 per person, but many exhibits are free. Registration forms are available at: MAILBOX 912A, Silver Springs, MD 20916-9129. The Air Force Association has contracted for rooms in many of the hotels. You would have to reserve any of these rooms through that organization, and they are expensive. The Circus Circus Hotel in Las Vegas had rooms available. which are not under contract with the Air Force Assoc. For reservations call: 1-800-444-2472. ROGER says there are rooms available at downtown hotels, but he suggests that you go through a travel agent to make reservations. Air shows will take place over two days. Many foreign nations will be represented with their aerobatics teams participating in addition to those representing our armed forces. A large number of air force chiefs of staff from many nations will be at a symposium and a conference which is by invitation only. Some programs will be open to the public. Among the many invited to this 50th anniversary are TONY MOONEY, Mayor of Townsville, Australia, and GRAHAM JENKINSON, who was Chairman of Coral Sea '92, the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Battle of the Coral Sea; Chairman of Victory in the Pacific '95, 50th year anniversary; and Chairman of End of WWII in the Pacific also a 50th year anniversary. GRAHAM had made the arrangements for the dedication of the 5th A. F. Monument in Townsville. In 1992, six bronze plaques were added to the memorial; on Mothers Day, 1944, a bronze plaque was added for the Australian and American women who served with the 5th A.F; and in 1995 a plaque was added in memory of the Air Force veterans of the Philippine-Java Campaign.

Both were among the 132 men who left Grand Island, NE, on Dec. 30, 1941, heading to the Brooklyn Navy Yard where they departed for Australia on Jan. 21, 1942. It was in Australia where they both eventually joined the 43rd Bomb Group. CHARLES flew most of his missions with Major BILL SMITH, 403rd. When BILL became squadron commander of the 65th, CHARLES stayed with SMITY. When the rest of the crew headed back to the States, CHARLES flew a few missions with WALTER BRENNEMAN, 65th, but then transferred back to the 403rd and flew a few missions with Lt. GEORGE PUTNAM before being rotated back to the U.S. CHARLES says that in the short time he was with GEORGE, he developed an extreme amount of respect for him which continues to this day. VALARIA and CHARLES like to visit GEORGE and his wife, MARY JO, whenever possible. Much to their shock, VALARIA and CHARLES, received a letter in late in October from MARY JO telling them that GEORGE had been diagnosed as suffering from inoperable cancer. CHARLES says that GEORGE "... sounded like his old self, joyful, upbeat and humorous, but that's the kind of fellow he is ... every day was a good day when you were around GEORGE." 
BOB ROTH, 403rd Gunner from Redlands, CA, has mailed in three very informative

letters. The first is a copy of one he had previously sent last May, but the following sad news had not been reported to the Group. BOB says that the three surviving members of ZASTROW's crew were saddened by the death of their engineer, MIRON DUKES of Bartlett, TN, on May 1st. He reports:

Navigator LEE LOUGHREY [West Chester, PA], Radioman BILL SOLOMON [Sarasota, FL] and Gunner BOB ROTH all talked to MIRON from his hospital room, within a day or two of his death. MIRON told me, 'he was going to make this fall's reunion even if he had put wheels on his hospital bed. We lost our original co-pilot, RALPH DEARDORFF, when we transferred into the 403rd squadron, as he refused to fly in a B-24. When we last heard from RALPH, he was first pilot on a B-17 that had been converted to a armed "biscuit bomber" and was hauling supplies to forward areas beyond the range of fighter protection. We had various co-pilots including HAROLD THOMPSON [Albuquerque, NM] who flew with us for many months before transferring to the Fifth Bomber Command as a first pilot. HAROLD is a member of our association, but has never attended a reunion.

BOB goes on to say that after reading Michael J. Claringbould's book, Black Sunday, he asked BILL to request, in the Newsletter, information from anyone who flew that day. He had one response, and it was from HAYDEN CLARK who wrote that he was flying co-pilot for Captain ZASTROW that Sunday, April 16, 1944. BOB read and reread HAYDEN's letter in almost disbelief. HAYDEN wrote that BOB's reply sent chills up and down his spine. HAYDEN and VIRGINIA did make Kissimmee this year, but BOB says that he believes pilot ERWIN C. ZASTROW, possibly Co-Pilot RALPH DEARDORFF, Bombardier FRED E. VESSELS, Engineer LLOYD R. DEMMY, Radioman PHILLIP C. TRA-VERS, Tail Gunner PAUL L. KAYLOR and MIRON were there in spirit.

In BOB's second letter, he reports that on the way to the Florida reunion he stopped at Hill AFB, Utah, to visit his great-grandson and the great-grandson's mother. (Grandson is in Korea for a year.) While there BOB fell and dislocated his arm and tore up his shoulder. He had to return home for an operation. That is why he and ARLENE did not make the Kissimmee reunion. The main reason for his letter is to inform the membership of the association that the 43rd Plaque which was to be placed on the Queen Mary was never placed on her. BOB served as co-host to the last reunion that was to have been held on the Queen Mary while the late JOSE HOLGUIN was host. After Disney pulled out of its commitment to the QM and Long Beach and moved the reunion to Anaheim, the Long Beach and LA papers were filled with stories and conjectures about the QM. JOSE and BOB visited the QM. Most of it was sealed off and they were given no explanation for this. BOB says it apparently was due to asbestos. So BOB and JOSE decided to hold off placing the plaque in a ship which rumor had destined for the scrap yards in Japan. So rather than wasting a good plaque, they decided to place it with the B-50, "LUCKY LADY II," which is located in the "Planes of Fame" museum at Chino, CA. BOB had the plaque mounted on a post under the 43rd BG Logo on the plane. Recall that the LUCKY LADY II was cited in the previous Newsletter as the first aircraft to fly around the world nonstop. Included with his letters are of the plaque by LUCKY LADY II as well as others of the plane's nose as well as the plaque. [See the pictures below. In his third letter, BOB tells that he returned to the Planes of Fame Museum on December 1st. Everything was as he had left it, but the plaque has turned green from the

smog and foul air. He heard a report on TV recently which indicated the Queen Mary may be towed to Tokyo for a \$20 million restoration and conversion into a hotel. On December 8th, BOB and ARLENE attended the B-17 CC&W Christmas party at the Candle Wood Country Club in Whittier, CA. They were fortunate to be seated with REBECCA HOLGUIN and son CURT along with HENRY GARCIA Jr. and his wife LINDA.

In May, 1985, the late **JOSE HOLGUIN**, 65TH, had pinned the DFC, Purple Heart and Silver Star on HENRY GARCIA Jr. when Sgt. **HENRY GARCIA**, who had been shot down over the jungles of New Britain in the South West Pacific 42 years earlier (HENRY Jr. was not yet one year old when his father was lost), was laid to rest with full military honors in Pennsylvania. JOSE, the lone survivor of the crash became a POW. He had vowed to locate the remains of his fellow crewmen. He found them buried on Hawaii and had arranged for them to be returned to their home states and given full military burials. HENRY and LINDA told BOB that, "They would not try to come to Albuquerque, THEY WOULD BE THERE and would bring sisters and other family members." BOB assured them that they would be most welcome as indeed they will be.

He also says that **DOROTHY DUKES** has always been known to him and other of her friends as MARIE MARIE explained that DOROTHY is her first name. She used this when teaching school and when she wrote a check for their life time membership. Thus, it has appeared that way in the Roster. BOB says his shoulder is doing great. Please change his area code from (714) to (909) in your ROSTER.

F. NEAL FUGATE, 63rd Pilot from Rancho Bernardo, CA, wants to report in the Newsletter what he reported at Kissimmee at the last reunion. "JACK RUCKERT, of Weems, VA, met an untimely death in July. The cause was a blood clot in his lung after what seemed to be a successful recovery from a bicycle accident." JACK was NEAL's Flight Engineer in B-24s and had planned to attend the last reunion.

Another comrade who has been located and has joined the association is **CHESTER P. DANOWS**, 64th Top Turret Gunner from Flat Rock, NC. He says that he served on the crew of Lt. **HOUGLUM**. It is always good to have new members join our association. Mrs. Dale Barr wants to continue to be a part of the 43rd. I have told Gen we wouldn't have it any other way. As much as Dale and Gen have done for the 43rd Bomb Group- it's real nice to still have Gen-- Drop her a note and let her know you want her-- she might even come to the New Mexico Reunion.

A note from **Douglas P. Walker**—son of **General Kenneth N. Walker** that was shot over Rabaul, January 1943, in a 43rd B-17 with a 43rd crew. **Martha Byrd**; a famous historian, has written a biography entitled, "**Kenneth N. Walker-Airpower's Untempered Crusader**." This book will be a publication by Air University Press, Maxwell AFB. Douglas will let us know when it will be available and ready to order. Several of us have sent Martha information on what we recall so watch for information in the news letter.

Had a note from Jose Holguin's son and he and the waist gunner's son are coming to the New Mexico reunion --I think. 59 Air Force men were shot down over Rabaul and captured- 13 survived, four from the 43rd and Jose and Joel Griffen, but most were executed. All totaled, according to the Japs, 126 allied flyers were captured. RNZAF 5 -2 survived, RAAF 35 - 4 were transferred to Japan -fate unknown, 15 U.S. Navy, 4 survived- 15 USMC- 2 survived. I still have a personal dislike for the Japs-- one for sure a Pilot Officer 1st Class Shigetoshi Kudo. On the night of June 26, 1943, he shot down Charles Trimingham's crew 65th. After working Trimmingham over, he took our crew over. The tail gunner reported he would blast us then drop down. We started twisting and turning and with great luck (skill?) we got away. The ground crew talked ugly to me for getting their plane scratched up-- Kudo was awarded a ceremonial sword for his nights work.

Mc Eachran, Col. Pettus and I were in the RCAF together.

Bill Schirmer, 65th maintenence from Walla Walla, Wash. sent in his dues and I checked his address label. Remember my Oper. Officer was from Walla Walla? I had lost contact with him-Bill ran him down for me and we had a nice phone visit after 50 years. Thanks, Bill.

Elmer E. Hanson, 63rd pilot, reports he tried my town of Snyder in the 50's. The dirt and dust ran him off. He went back in the Army at Homestat, Lincoln, NE.-- froze out and landed in Austin, Texas and bought a farm at Thorndale near Austin.
