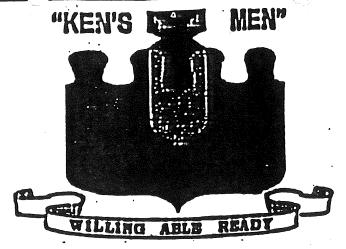

********** FROM SAMUEL F. COMMONS, PRESIDENT

It is an honor to have been chosen to be President of the "WILLING ABLE READY"
43rd Bomb Group Association. Since learning of the organization's existence eight years
ago, I have made attendance at the annual reunions a priority. It's been great renewing
friendships of fifty years ago and also getting to know scores of other men of the 43rd.
The reunions at Norfolk, Anaheim, Omaha, San Antonio, Cheyenne, Kissimmee, and
Albuquerque were all wonderful experiences.

We are indebted to the organization's founder, Bob Butler. He has continued to work with Commanding Officer, Jim Pettus, and the presidents and board members to keep the organization alive and growing. We appreciate the fine job our outgoing President Jim Murphy has done, as well as the ongoing work of our Treasurer, Bill Wilson. Bill is a past president and his contribution to the group is immeasurable. He is truly "Mr. 43rd Bomb Group." An essential element keeping us together is our quarterly newsletter. Our Secretary, Jim Cherkauer, spends a lot of time compiling and editing it and it improves with each issue. We all owe Jim and his wife, Anita, our deepest appreciation for providing this vital means of communication. I was especially pleased that Max Axelsen was chosen as our vice president. Because I haven't had the privilege of meeting many of you personally, I'll share a bit about myself. Many of you recall similar experiences during the war years. Soon after my 18th birthday I enlisted in the USAAF for pilot training. Rather than wait for a call to flight school, I decided in October 1942 to go to the Aviation Mechanic School and was sent to Kessler Field in Mississippi. After completing mechanic's training, I was sent to the B-24 Willow Run Assembly plant in Michigan. From there I went to Gunner School at Harlingen, Texas. In July 1943, I was assigned to the Cain/Decesare crew in

Tucson, Arizona, as flight engineer/top turret gunner.

We lest the USA on November 28, 1943, with Major Jim Pettus as our C.O. and ar-

rived in New Guinea on December 28th. Our crew was stationed in Dobodura, Nadzab, Owi and Leyte. After fi -three missions I returned the A on February 16, 1945.

After graduating from Drexel University as an engineer in 1951, I worked fifteen years as plant engineer and factory superintendent for Honeywell. In 1966, I started a company doing consulting, private detective/security work and electrical contracting.

I've been enjoying retirement since 1990. My wife, Helen, is an RN working parttime, and we have three married daughters and a son who is in college. As I told the general meeting in Albuquerque when I was elected, "We have a lot more capable people in this organization than I. However, I AM WILLING to do my best for the organization."

RICHARD H. In a very considerate and thoughtful move, NICK ARABINKO, 64th Pilot from Punta Gorda, FL, composed a letter which highlighted the events at the Albuquerque reunion. He sent this to several 64th men who could not make the reunion, and sent copies to the current officers of the association as well as some past presidents.

Thief Of Police in the Town of Linektowaga, a suburb of Buffalo. In the news article it mentions that TED shot down 7 planes during WW II while he was serving as a copilot on a B-24. TED included a letter explaining the story and claim for the 7 planes shot down. It is best told in his own words.

You did know that I'm the only B-24 co-pilot who shot down seven planes, right? Well it was in the paper on the front page and you have to believe what's

in the paper, right!!!

What happened was that Michelle, "a pretty thing" who was assigned to our department as the news reporter, interviewed me prior to my retirement. She was so nervous that I tried to reassure her by putting humor in our conversation. She asked me about my war record and I said, "Well, I shot down seven planes ... pause ... then they the sent me overseas. Ha! Ha!" She believed me, didn't get the joke and printed it.

And would you believe that a lot of people (not Air Corps) believed it and congratulated me. The Captain of the 152nd Army Engineer Battalion, who presented me with an award at my retirement (They had trained my SWAT team) said jokingly, "Even God, who was a co-pilot (referring to Ted Lawson's book, GOD

IS MY CO-PILOT) could not shoot down seven planes."

You can imagine the flak I received from my buddies.

TED reports that the cancer for which he has been treated for some time now has mostly disappeared although he is still undergoing chemo. He has lost a good deal of weight but feels great and is keeping that weight off. TED says that he lives on an 80 acre piece of property which is surrounded by 3,000 acres of state land. [Cassadaga is one of the several beautiful parts of Western New York.]

From Australia TOM FITZGERALD, Associate member, reports that he has now retired from the position of Secretary of the No. 24 Squadron Association New South Wales, and A. T. 'BERT' WOLFE is the new secretary.

At about the same time this editor contacted or was contacted by e-mail by CLIFF, he received e-mail from CY K. AESH, Secretary/Editor of the 1 d BG Assoc. We have exchanged a great deal of history of our organizations. CY also was in the 380th before joining the 22nd. It is interesting to note how the 22nd, the 43rd and the 90th all seem to make the same claims about some missions. In fact, while reading a good deal of material on one WWW devoted to B-24s, I noticed that the 13th AAF claims to have been instrumental in sinking the aircraft carrier (see Oct. '97 Newsletter) at Kure, Japan, which the 64th, and maybe the 65th also, was given credit for sinking on July 28, 1945.

You will find this an immense site. It can overwhelm you. You will also notice that the 90th, the 22nd and the 380th Groups from the 5th Bomber Command have many notices and stories posted. You should note the almost total absence of anything from the 43rd BG. The editor has posted a couple of messages including a notice of our next reunion in Springfield. He did find a couple of persons from the 43rd seeking information about missing crew members, but when he contacted them and told them about our association, he received no response at all. This is very disappointing. There are many pictures of B-24s, crews, targets, etc., which you may view and download. There are interesting articles on the bombings of Balikpapan, Hong Kong and Kure Naval Base. Again, there is little of no reference to the 43rd taking part in any of this action.

MICHAEL K. SASSAMAN is researching the career of his father, FRANCIS J. SASSAMAN, 63rd Pilot, and would like to hear from anyone who knew his father while in the 43rd. FRANCIS joined the 63rd in July, 1945, and was with the squadron through the end of the war. His records indicate that he flew only one combat mission on September 2nd or 3rd. He was 28 years of age at the time and hailed from Pennsylvania.

FRANCIS first served as a copilot in September, 1943, in the newly formed 392nd Bomb Group in Europe after earning his wings and commission June 30, 1943. He joined the AAF on July 4, 1942. Upon completion of 28 missions in Europe he returned to the States in July 1944. After a tour of serving training other pilots and crews for a year, he took a crew to the Pacific in July 1945.

Following the war, FRANCIS stayed in service and flew C-47s and C-54s in the Berlin Airlift. Then he made the transition to jet fighters in the 50s before retiring as a Major in 1963.

Our past president, MAXWELL E. OSBORN, 65th Navigator from Sun Lakes, AR, mailed some nice compliments to the Editor and Secretary. He also reports that reading MARCUS CARRELL'S (65th Pilot from Houston, TX) remarks about LUCKY LUCILLE in a recent Newsletter, reminded him that he and his crew flew that aircraft out of Dobodura. They were the first crew to fly the plane as their Pilot, PARKER S. FLOYD, had the painting put on the nose from either a Varga or Petty girl. It was named for his girl friend. A short time later her received a Dear John letter. Recalling other crew members, MAX names PAT FREEMAN as Copilot (Eagle River, WI), WILLIAM WESLEY FRAZIJER IV as Bombardier and himself as Navigator. MAX rotated in Feb. '44, so he missed the Signal Corps pictures, but he remembers KAPITAN, POULSEN and MILLER named by MARCUS. MAX says that he believes that he and PAT FREEMAN are the only ones of them to attend a reunion.

A friend of MAX wrote to him to say that he had seen a ad for KEN'S MEN AGAINST THE EMPIRE in Zenith Publications. MAX called JAMES PETTUS, 43rd C.O. and Pilot, in Hawaii, and JIM confirmed that he had heard of the publication. This seems to indicate that our history will indeed be published.

MAX said that he had received from President SAMUEL COMMONS, 65th Flight Engineer, a copy of the picture showing SAM receiving the Philippine Liberation Medal and

Enclosed with the letter m MAX OSBORN was a letter h ad received from FRANK H. STAGNER of 3105 Kenland Drive, San Jose, CA 95111-3239. FRANK sent MAX his belated thanks for having his request for information about Snooper missions over Manila during the week prior to Christmas, 1944, printed in the January 1995, Newsletter. He had heard from ORION L. ROGERS, 63rd Pilot from Sun City West, AR.

Quoting directly from FRANK:

One of my main endeavors had been to try and identify the snooper unit and the aircrew possibly responsible for "delivering" a few of the Christmas leaflets to our prison camp on Christmas Day, 1944! Although being literally starved to death by our Nip jailers, these leaflets were far more exciting than the thoughts of an extra half ration of soupy and wormy rice promised for our Christmas meal.

Of course, I have also been searching for a copy of the said leaflets! In any case, thanks to Orion's descriptive reports and other information furnished by James Pettus, I am happily convinced those night-flying aircraft were actually from the 63rd Bomb. Sqd.

I did manage to clearly observe one of those Snoopers two or three nights prior to the above mentioned deliveries. My Mother had awakened my brother and myself, explained there was an air raid in progress and that we both should take shelter. As I bailed out of our bamboo and nipa hut, I noticed the area over Manila Bay was well illuminated by the beams of a large number of searchlights.

I quickly observed a lone B-24 Liberator literally glowing white while caught in the confluence of the light beams. Also observed were streams and streams of red tracer balls heading towards the Lib but thankfully, arcing and falling away short. I suspected the a/c flew directly over a few ships as some of the red balls arose in a vertical stream and appeared to possibly hit the Lib but would sort of falter then fall away.

The bomber was last observed still heading in a direction generally towards the Clark Field area before all the searchlight suddenly went out.

Max, if I may digress, there have been many questions raised as to my being able to identify any of our aircraft but let me say that it was easy. I had a few pre-war U.S. magazines in my possession and on some of the pages were photos of our then current a/c including some X models! The nose configurations as shown on the B-24D photos and the actual Libs thundering overhead may have been different but I was firmly convinced they were B-24 Liberators!

The daylight bombing attacks began either on the 20th or 21st of December and were executed by both the 22nd and the 494th Heavy Bomb Groups.

Another member referring to MARCUS CARRELL's remarks in the Oct. '97 Newsletter is PATRICK J. FREEMAN, 65th Pilot from Eagle River, WI. PAT says that the man referred to as LLOYD in those remarks about the aircraft LUCKY LUCILLE, was FLOYD - PARKER S. FLOYD. PAT agrees that PARKER named the aircraft. In that crew were Sgts. OLSEN, ADAMSON, ELINGER, DEFFINDERFER, CHASE and NOYES. The officers included Lts. FLOYD, FREEMAN, MAX OSBORN and W.W. FRAZIER IV from Roxborough Farms, PA. Quoting PAT, "It was the 'Million Dollar Crew."

PAT also enclosed a check for his dues and then some. He says that like a good many

others with regard to that "book," he is beginning to feel "We have been had."

After seeing his name on the list "Bill's Bad Boys," WATHEN F. CODY, 63rd Flight

Engineer from Tell City, IN, mailed in his life time dues. He does not want to be late with his dues again. WAT! I says that he served in the 63! From early 1942. He flew with McCULLAR, MURPHY, LUTLER, BECKSTROM, DIEFFENLERFER, DEER, DELOACH, Gen. RAMEY, Major BENN, BARNETT, CHILES of the 19th Group, HIRSCH, BANKROFT, BURKOWITZ and many others he couldn't recall at the time he wrote. [Many of these names are probably those of some of our current members, but the editor will not attempt to make that conclusion even though so many similar names appear in our 1996 Roster as well as in the book, SKIP BOMBING, by our immediate past president JAMES T. MURPHY, 63rd Pilot.]

BEN R. DAMRON, 65th [Ground Crew?], from Stanford, KY, wrote that he had a letter from JAMES "MAC' McCLURE, 65th from Suitland, MD. MAC had noticed that BEN made the reunion in Albuquerque, but MAC could not attend at he has not been in the best of health and was in Bethesda at the time of the reunion.

BEN said that his going to the reunion was touch and go right up until the day before he and JANE would be leaving if they were to attend. His doctor gave him a prescription for asthma in case BEN had an attack while at the reunion, and then the doctor told him to go and enjoy it. BEN says that he did, but he missed seeing a lot of the old ground crew members there.

Ben had asked for another Newsletter to be mailed to him as he did not receive one that MAC had already. Then BEN fired off another letter later that same day, Nov. 5th, to say that his Newsletter arrived in the afternoon mail. [It has taken the USPS an unusually long time to deliver the Oct. Newsletter to some parts of the country.]

Our new President, SAMUEL F. COMMONS, 65th Flight Engineer from Flourtown, PA, sent e-mail on the Nov. 10th to say that he had just received a phone call from DOC "BUD" GUSACK, 65th Flight Surgeon from Chevy Chase, MD. DOC was reporting the passing of JOSHUA H. BARNES Jr., 65th B-17 Pilot from Winchester, KY, on Nov. 8, 1997. He served in the era of WILLIAM H. WILSON Jr., 65th Pilot from Snyder, TX. JOSH's wife ALICE was with him in the hospital in Winchester at the time of his passing. They last attended a reunion in Cheyenne, WY. DOC had notified JAMES T. PETIUS, 43rd C.O. and Pilot from Honolulu, HI, also a friend of JOSH in the service.

Just 3 days after Veterans Day, ANN BACON called to report that her husband, LAY-TON P. BACON 65th Ground Crewman from Pierson, FL, was in very critical condition. He was under the care of Hospice at that time. ANN said that LAYTON had named the plane, GEORGIA PEACH, and that R. F. "BOB" WATSON, 65th Bombardier from Lebanon, IL, the general coordinator, along with IRENE, for the yearly reunions, flew in that plane.

ROBERT A. CLAYCOMBE, 65th Pilot from Indianapolis, IN, found the last reunion to be great. He says his crew arrived on Ie Shima near the end of the war so he does not know know many of the veterans mentioned in the Newsletter, but 4 members of his crew made it to Albuquerque. Besides BOB they include the Copilot, WILLIAM C. MYLES from Campbellsville, KY, Navigator HAROLD BUELOW, from Culleoka, TN, and Engineer BETHEL F. RAY from Arrington, TN.

He enclosed his dues with his letter and inquired about VIRGINIA MATHIAS from Andover, MA. The 65th registration sheet at the reunion shows VIRGINIA MATHIAS (GINGRANDE), and he wants to know if she has a new name or has remarried and has a new address. If you read this VIRGINIA, why not let BOB know? BOB is another of our members hooked up to the Internet. He and the editor have been in contact several times via e-mail.

Enclosed with his '98 dues ROMEO E. FURIO, 65th from Monessen, PA, reports that he has had operations for a quadruple by-pass, double hernia, gall bladder removal, double cataracts and double implants in his eyes. He hopes that now he will be able to keep up with what is going on.

ROMEO says "Hello" to ther 65th buddies: GENE MURAP Maintenance from Florrisant, MO; DOC MILTON & ACK, Flight Surgeon from Chev, Chase, MD; and ALBERT PEPE, Armament Officer from Snyder, NY.

When remitting his '98-'99 dues, **HUGH H. HIMES**, Headquarters from Cheyenne, WY, says he is sorry he missed the '97 reunion, but it could not be helped. He is looking forward to the '98 reunion in Springfield. He reports that all is fine in Wyoming.

Along with many of you saying you appreciate the Newsletter is **JOHN J PERKINS**, 403rd Nose Gunner from Dallas, TX. JOHN also enclosed his '98 dues.

It is always difficult to report the passing of another of our buddies. Mrs. JOHN W. BERTRAM has notified us that JOHN W. BERTRAM, 65th from Fairfax, VA, died of cancer on August 23, 1997.

Equally sad is the news that NATHAN J. MALNEKOFF, Chicago, IL, passed away on June 26, 1997.

RICHARD B. BELL, 403rd Truck Mechanic from Omaha, NE, mailed BILL his '98 dues along with a new phone number. His area code has been changed: 402-556-8678.

RICHARD says that his wife, FLORENCE, is still under the care of Hospice and has been for nearly a year. He says that she seems to be holding her own, but is quite weak

and has difficulty getting around.

formal surrender.

He said that he had many exciting and possible disasters happen to him along the way. Most were in B-25s. He is still able to talk and write about those experiences, but he knows that "A lot of fine and good men aren't."

The October Newsletter of the 90th Bomb Group Assoc. summarizes the events at their last national reunion in Santa Clara, CA, last Sept. The September Newsletter of the No. 24 SQUADRON ASSOC. NEW SOUTH WALES carries an article which might be of interest to those of you who were in Australia in 1942. The writer claims that the story has been top secret and still is, but he is not bound to this because he did not sign the Secrecy Declaration. The story follows:

During the Jap air raids on Darwin in 1942, a large force of Japanese parachuted

into the Darwin area.

Our Army forces defeated these troops in fierce hand-to-hand fighting. No prisoners were taken as Japs laying Doggo killed quite a few of our troops, so they made certain that any Jap, either hooked up in a tree by his parachute lines or laying doggo on the ground, were dead.

One Aussie casualty with a serious leg wound was taken to a hospital. He hooked his Dog Tags on the bed then forgot about them. He was quickly evacuated to Adelaide to have his leg amputated. A further casualty from the action took his vacated bed and died.

The Dog Tags and the 2nd bed-taker were buried at Adelaide River War Cemetery

under the first casualty' name.

The first casualty's we was advised of his death, and then he eventually arrived home, she said, "What are you doing here? You're dead."

They have both viewed his War Grave which is still in Adelaide River War

Cemetery.

Each Army member at the time, had to sign a Secrecy Declaration, as news of this action would have caused Panic and Pandemonium all over Australia.

Even the 50 years Statute of Limitations does not apply to these Veterans, and

today they are still denied Recognition for their Heroic Action.

During the Bob Menzies time as Prime Minister, the remains of the Japanese were exhumed and returned to Japan for an Honorable Burial. - ANOTHER SECRET.

An item that would be of interest to many of you who knew the late FR. THOMAS F. SHEA, Chaplain from Headquarters, comes from THOMAS W. JAMISON, 65th Pilot from Ojai, CA. TOM wrote that he had made a video of FR. SHEA's last memorial service in Bossier City [LA] in 1987. He had made copies for the late DICK WOOD and JOSE HOLGUIN. After talking with JIM PETTUS, 43rd Pilot and CO from Honolulu, in Albuquerque, he made a cassette tape of the audio portion of the video. JIM suggested that this might be played at a future reunion since it may be too difficult to get the right set up to show the video. Tom says the tape runs about 6 minutes, but running the video, if it can be arranged would be even better. [ATTENTION: BOB WATSON and RUSS BURNETT.]

Enclosed with his check for '98 dues LON H.
